Background: In 1979, the Fisk University Department of Art solicited photographs pertaining to the history of Jefferson Street. The photos collected were used to establish an archive on local history and subsequently served as materials for an exhibit held in the Van Vechten Gallery.

Jefferson Street, so named for Thomas Jefferson, in many ways typifies the cultural growth of Nashville. Over the years, it has been a witness to the horse drawn carriages, street cars, the depression era, the turbulent 1960s, and so much more.

Jefferson Street began in the 1800s. As testament to its longevity, the John Geist and Sons Blacksmith Shop called Third Ave home for than one hundred years; 1886-2006. Aldolphus Heiman, an architect and Confederate Army colonel was also among the early inhabitants.

Continuing with the 1900s, there were many sights to behold: cobblestone streets, department stores, movie theaters, food markets, drugstores, churches, riots, parades, doctor's offices, and residences. During the 1950s and 1960s, entertainment spots electrified the street with the sounds of B.B. King, Aretha Franklin and such novelty acts as Ironing Board Sam. Firehouse No. 11, once located on Twelfth Avenue, was one of the first black companies organized in the United States.

Of significant importance are the presence of Fisk University, Tennessee State University, and Meharry Medical College; all institutions of higher learning. These institutions have continued to reach out to the local and national communities through educational programs and activities.

The Jefferson Street Photo Project was directed by Robert Hall, former curator of the Van Vechten Gallery at Fisk University.

Scope and Content Note: The Jefferson Street Photo Project Collection consists of three archival boxes (1.5 linear feet). The small collection contains information concerning the formulation of the project, correspondence, taped interviews, and an abundance of photographs depicting historical Jefferson Street.
