BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

As of February 2006, Albert Kavanah has not been identified. It is unclear how the collection was attained.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

The Albert Kavanah Collection contains two boxes, and consists of eight series. This collection includes Clippings, Invitations, Post Cards, Programs, Promotional, Publications, Requests/ Solicitation and Miscellaneous items regarding activity within the artistic world, primarily in Cleveland, Ohio and New York, New York. Artists such as Marian Anderson, Katherine Dunham, Natalie Leota Henderson, Caterina Jarboro, Howard Roberts, and Fred Thomas; organizations such as the National Association of Negro Musicians; legendary concert halls like Carnegie Hall and Radio City Music Hall; production companies like Karamu House and copies of such publications as *Playbill* and *Organ Institute Quarterly* all make the Albert Kavanah Collection extremely valuable to researchers interested in musical performances and dramatic interpretations in Cleveland and New York from the 1930s to 1980.

Series I: Clippings

The **Clippings** series consists of Cleveland newspaper coverage of popular culture happenings, criticisms and commentary in non-consecutive years, 1963—1980.

Series II: Invitations

The **Invitations** series holds personal and organizational requests of time to attend a recital or professional meeting.

Series III: Post Cards

The **Post Cards** series consists of two cards: one of the Robinson Family, a 1970s Public Broadcasting television series with a young and aspiring Howard Rollins; and the other of New York City's Temple Emanu-el [sic], founded in 1845.

Series IV: Programs

The **Programs** series represents the largest portion of the collection and consists of five subseries: **civic organization annuals**; **convocations**; **music**; **obsequies**; **and testimonials**. The **civic organization annuals** and **convocations** subseries are arranged alphabetically by organization or institution name. The **music** subseries is organized alphabetically by name of the venue holding the respective event. The **obsequies** subseries contains programs of Rev. Alfred Isaac and the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s memorial services in Atlanta, Georgia on April 9, 1968. The **testimonials** subseries is arranged alphabetically by institution or individual who is being recognized and/or honored.

Series V: Promotional

The **Promotional** series contains brochures and flyers designed to promote an entertainer's art, production company's services or organization's programming initiatives. They are arranged alphabetically.

Series VI: Publications

The **Publications** series is arranged alphabetically and holds copies of *American Guild of Organists Quarterly; Fine Arts; New; Organ Institute Quarterly, The Open Door; The Playbill; The Worker Musician; and This is Opera.* The years 1932—1978 are covered in non consecutive years.

Series VII: Requests/ Solicitation

The **Requests**/ **Solicitation** series consist of donation requests from the United Negro College Fund/ Inter-Alumni Council and the Women's Civic League respectively.

Series VIII: Miscellaneous

The **Miscellaneous** series contains the last two remaining documents that did not fall within one of the previous series. A copy of Giuseppe Verdi's musical score, "Libretto," composed in 1792, is held with the original Italian, French and German lyrics and English translations. An unidentified choir photograph appears in this series as well.
